Pastor's Pen

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."

- God in Isaiah 43:19, ESV

I remember a conversation that took place when I was younger. It was after supper during the summer break after my 5th grade year. We were clearing off the table when mom said, "Hey boys, I got a letter from the School District today. Guess what? That new school is finished and that's where you'll be going this fall." My brother looked at me and I thought, "Well, here's where I need to put on a happy face." Honestly, though, there was no happy face there. We had been told towards the end of the school year that this was planned. And Susie asked who was going to go there and who was going to stay. The teacher didn't know, but she did make it clear that we were going to be split up and mixed up with the other elementary school in town. And just to be clear, "new" isn't always something I look forward to, especially when I lack a perception of control. I wasn't excited about this at all. And as a result (if memory serves me well) my younger brother then wasn't excited, either. Mom saw our faces and did her best to make the best of it. I wasn't buying it. This was going to be horrible, I just new it.

And to be brutally honest, the first month or so wasn't the best of times. Everything was different. In the school where I came from, the 6th graders were the oldest and they knew everything. Not so for this 6th grade class. The layout of the school was different. The teachers were all different. There was a lady in the principal's office who was a Doctor but she couldn't fix anyone. ("What kind of doctor can't fix someone?" I remember distinctly thinking). I never had that before. Even the books in the Library were different. To top it off, there was a guy who was about twice my size who took a fancy in seeing if he could get me to cry. I just wanted to go back to school where most of my friends still were.

"Any better today?" Dad would ask at the supper table. "No." "Well, hang in there. It'll turn around. Watch and see." "If he only knew about the bully," I thought.

When I read the verse above, those first few months of 6th grade come to mind. Sometimes something new isn't something desired. For the Jews to whom Isaiah is writing, they aren't going to like this new thing God is about to do, either. He's going to have them dragged off to Babylonia. That'll be new! ...and painful beyond description.

But God wasn't necessarily talking about the trip to Babylonia when he made that declaration above. He was talking more about starting something new in the hearts of the people. Their hearts had grown cold and complacent. They thought that their lives would never change because they were God's chosen people and so why work at it? Why seek God when everything they needed was already in their possession? So God put in motion that which would start a new thing between Him and His people.

Sound familiar? Now God was clearly disciplining the Jews when He allowed Nebuchadnezzar on the scene. We know that because He tells us that over and over again in many of the Old Testament books. Are we being disciplined now with this new thing we are living through? I think there is a lot of opportunities for learning and growing closer to God in the midst of this new thing. The question is, "Do we perceive it?" Or are we just looking at the brand new uncharted wilderness in front of us, or the deserts that seem to have no resources to sustain us?

Do you see what God did in his declaration there in Isaiah 43:19. He declares a new thing, yes. But he also promises to take care of the Jews in this new thing. He'll make a path through what they perceive as uncharted. He'll provide water in the desert. The new thing isn't so much their geographical location as to how He is going to draw them closer in dependence upon Him, where they should have been all along.

He has a patent on turning mourning into dancing, and tears into joy. He did the same for the Jews in their new thing. He let Shadrach, Mechach and Abednego walk around INSIDE a furnace with Him right there in their midst. He raised up Daniel who became a world changer in three different world powers, not to mention a sleep over with a bunch of lions. He put Esther in just the right place for just a time as this. And when the time was right, He sent Nehemiah and Ezra back to start an even newer thing of regeneration along with reconciliation. True to his word, God never left them nor forsook them. And God hasn't changed one bit since then.

In a very real sense, that which is taking place around us today should give us great hope for it is proof that God is at work in profound ways. I mean, look at the lengths He is going to to do this new thing! And yes, new things can be tough at first until we figure things out. That's OK. We've got God who knows what's going on and He'll carry us through. But He must be up to something big, yes? I mean, what will we be talking about 2-3 years from now about how God used this whole COVID-19 thing?

Sixth grade did turn around for me. That bully? I think I've already told you about him. We actually became almost friends when I forgave him which kept him out of Juvie. I think it was the first time in his entire life he experienced true forgiveness. I got to become a millionaire. True story there. We had a mini-economy unit for Social Studies where we were able to open little shops for the last couple hours of class each day for the other 6th graders. I decided to bring popcorn and sell it. The teacher had to print more money all the time to keep the project going. I did have to do a lot of chores around the house to make up for the popcorn popper I burnt out in the process, though. The principal was so impressed, she asked me to help her start a school store. It's the first time I really stepped out of my shell and took any kind of real leadership. And that Doctor that couldn't fix anything? She became one of my most biggest encouragers throughout the rest of my public education. Even in High School, Dr. Trujillo was always checking up on me and telling me, "You can do it, Darren. You can't afford to mess up here. Stay the course. I believe in you!" I still have her letter of recommendation for college. I can't read it without getting all teary.

I would have missed out on all of that if I would have had my way and just passed by the "new thing" that God had in store in the new school. Oh, what a mistake we make when the sky gets dark and we think that worrying about it will bring back the sunshine of yesterday! When the clouds are there only to water the plans that God has already put in motion. Let God do His new thing and trust that He knows what He's doing. He hasn't lost an ounce of hope and neither should we!

The more Paul and Silas focused on the Lord, the smaller their problem became.
